Biography

Thomas Eacott married his second wife Charlotte Tuckey 2 July 1839 at Mandurah. Charlotte arrived with her father John Tuckey and brother James on the ship 'Rockingham'. Thomas and Charlotte moved to Barragup to manage the Bowes Estate. Here near the shores of Lake Coegerup (Willy's Lakes) they had their new home, however, some year later they returned to their former homestead in Mandurah. Moroerinup, later known as Barragup House, which was also part of the Bowes Estate, was once the home of Thomas and Charlotte. The original home was washed away in the floods of 1862 but the remains are still visible on the edge of the Serpentine River. Two of their ten children were born there. Charlotte died on the 15 July 1871 at Barragup and Thomas died on the 15 June 1887 at Mandurah. Both are lying side by side in the old church ground at Christ Church, Mandurah. The Eacott family history has been compiled into a book called 'The Eacotts of Mandurah 1830-1997' listing 1663 descendants for eight generations of Thomas and Charlotte Eacott.

Biography

Thomas was the second son of William and Sarah (nee Humphreys). He married first wife Elizabeth in 1826. They had two children but only one Ann Priscilla arrived with them in the Rockingham. Elizabeth aged 27 years died in 'childbed' on the beach at Clarence on 13 June 1830, soon after the traumatic grounding of the 'Rockingham' in Cockburn Sound and was buried in the sandhills nearby. Presumably the child was stillborn or died soon after and was buried with her as no record has been found for the child.

Thomas was an indentured servant to Thomas Peel. Thomas and the other immigrants looked to Peel for leadership during the difficult and harrowing times at Clarence and for some time after the arrival of the 'Rockingham' Peel's behaviour was callous and indifferent. In August 1830 a petition was sent to the Governor and signed by Thomas and several other indentured servants, for fresh provisions. By the time summer had arrived the majority of his workers had sought release from their indentures and left him. Being a widower with a small child, Thomas and Anne Priscilla followed Thomas Peel to Mandurah, and despite all the hardships suffered at the hand of Peel, he was eventually free of Peel and did consequently own his land.

His descendants still live in Mandurah today. Ann married Daniel Charles Myrick, an American on the 1 March 1843 at Mandurah. They had five children. On the 7 October 1852 the family departed on the ship 'Merope' for the Eastern States. In a letter dated 13 November 1887 written by Anne to her step-sister Eleanor in Mandurah, she said 'I was very sorry to hear of my father's death, I sent my likeness, did he live to see it?' and 'please send me your likeness'. By this time the family were living in America. Thomas Eacott had married a second time to Charlotte Tuckey 2 July 1839 at Perth. Charlotte died 15 July 1872 and Thomas died 16 June 1887.

Biography

Hannah Crane arrived with parents John (Benjamin) and Elizabeth. Married c1842. John Eakins came to the Swan River Colony as a 16 year old indentured servant of George Fletcher Moore, a bachelor barrister from County Tyrone in Ireland and three other servants. Eakins went with Moore to his land grant at Upper Swan. His tasks included clearing light brushwood, killing snakes, planting vegetables, trenching the wheat ground, mending his shoes, enclosing a field, racking hay, collecting wheat from Guildford for the pigs, thatching a shed, felling gum trees with a cross cut saw, wheat sowing, dibbling it with forks, whitewashing, washing sheep for shearing and building a kitchen.

Sometime after 31 July 1833 Eakins left the employ of Moore. He returned in February 1835 - a great strapping fellow, able for any work. Moore hired him at 35 shillings a month. At some stage he was at the Canning as an Agricultural labourer and at another he was the Swan blacksmith and wheelwright. He was, for a time, in partnership with J Minchin as a sawyer, but this was dissolved in 1841.

In 1842 he married Hannah Crane who had also worked for George Fletcher Moore. In the 1860's the family moved to Greenough where John became a farmer, owning 72 acres of freehold land. John employed 20 ticket-of-leave men on occasions between 1864 and 1881. One of these was in partnership with Robert Bell and Henry Eaves.

John died on 12 December 1898 at Greenough (85 years). Hannah died on 15 August 1903 at Greenough (79 years). She left 30 grandchildren and 20 great grandchildren. Both are buried in the Greenough cemetery.

Biography

Richard originally came to the Colony with Thomas Peel. After the disastrous settlement scheme failed he moved to Guildford. Richard was employed as manager for Captain FC Irwin and WH Mackie at 'Henley Park' until 1837. In the mid 1830's Lionel Samson's property 'Clearwells' 'E' was divided and half transferred to Richard Edwards' 'E1' (2348 acres).

In the 1837 census Richard Edwards' was one of two properties in the Swan Districts to have sheep. On his property of 60 acres - he had 200 sheep. In 1838 Lieutenant H. Bull, who was a Justice of the Peace, engaged Richard, who was at 'Henley Park' to build him a two storey house on his property. His house when completed was said to be one of the finest in the colony, rivalled only in size and grandeur by the two-storeyed house of Captain Irwin and WH Mackie, which was then also in the process of construction by Richard. Richard had been a master brick maker in England, and he burnt bricks for both houses from clay found locally.

Also in 1838 on one acre of land donated by Irwin and Mackie he built the 'All Saints Church' in Upper Swan with his band of volunteers, one of which was John Foss Tonkin who did most of the timber work. The foundation stone was laid on 31 October 1839 and the opening service was held on the 10 January 1841. It was rectangular design and has slight gothic influences in the form of pointed windows and the bell turret. It is still standing. In 1841 one of his sons was mentioned fighting a fire on Meare's property. In 1848 another of his sons was hurt in an explosion at the WA Mining Co.

In 1850 a devastating bush fire reached Captain Irwin's estate of 'Henley Park' and destroyed all the outer buildings, most of the crops and the whole of the farm machinery. Leaving only the two-storeyed homestead still standing. The same fire burned down the house at the adjoining property of Richard Edwards. Edwards himself was seriously ill at that time and had to be carried from the burning house on his bed. It seemed as fate would have it, Richard, who had devoted most of his life to W.A. to improving his own and Irwin's properties, had been forced to witness the whole of his achievements go up in flames.

Richard died on 19 March 1850 aged 75 years and 11 months. Elizabeth died on 26 April 1866 aged 84 years. Both are buried at 'All Saints Church' at Upper Swan. The inscription on the headstone of Richard Edwards and Elizabeth (nee Powell) reads: 'Here lies the remains of Richard Edwards who departed this life aged 75 years 11 months. March 19th AD 1850 - also - Elizabeth Edwards who departed this life 26th April 1866 in the 84th year of her age. This world is vain and full of pain, with cares and troubles sore; But they are blest who are at Rest, With Christ for ever more; Now by God, seek thy soul salvation; Seek the Lord while time you have'.

His sons Joshua, Matthew and Samuel with their wives were noted pioneers of the Gin Gin area. It should also be noted that the Edwards' oldest son Josiah and daughter Mary remained in England when the family came out to the Swan River Colony.

William and Eleanor married at Speldhurst Kent in February 1817. William was a Rifleman in the 95th Regiment of the British Army. William and Eleanor with their four children arrived on the ship 'Rockingham'. This ship was buffeted by a storm and swept to Cockburn Sound where it ran aground at Mangles Bay. Passengers salvaged some luggage but were forced to live on the beach as the project organised by Thomas Peel failed.

William joined John Garrett Bussell from Blackwood River to Vasse. The Edwards family then lived at Guildford between 1832 and 1841. William became a tenant farmer on land owned by Governor Stirling and Eleanor began a shop. She is remembered for the straw hats she wove from reeds. They then moved to Helena River where they owned land and then to 'Sandgate' at Beverley. They owned 'Speldhurst' and 'Seaton Ross' properties. Eleanor opened a shop near a church which was built in their honour at 'Edwards Crossing' on the old Beverley Road. Descendants of their family still own and farm the original properties.

Joseph was a shepherd to the Hardy's who, with the Clarksons, had chartered the ship for the journey. The Hardy family were allotted land on what is now known as the Maylands Peninsula on the Swan River. Joseph probably stayed with the Hardy's for approx. 1 year. Joseph was granted Perth Lot N4 (where the Red Cross is located now) in 1833. Joseph, it would seem was paid 1/3 portion of 200 acres in land at South Perth, in return for building a house for Louis De Mayo, a boatman of Perth. He is registered as being a Thatcher (memorial no 424 registered 20 July 1836). The document registered is 803, 22 June 1839, in which Joseph and his wife Hannah sold Perth Building Lot F12 (near the corner of Hay and William Streets - North side) to George Shenton, Chemist and Druggist for the sum of one hundred pounds sterling. Joseph died in South Perth of Carcinoma - on 31 August 1847 (D/Cert. 273 no age stated). Hannah died in Perth on 14 May 1850 at the age of 64 years; this would put her birth date around 1786. William his son, in his early days is hard to follow. It appears he may have owned Town Lot 9 in Geraldton. In his obituary in the Beverley Times it states the family were in the Beverley area in the early 1840's. William married Ann Fraser, of St Aubins, a property southeast of the present township in St Pauls Church in what was to be the original town of Beverley on the 30 June 1867. Ann Fraser was born 2 August 1831 in Morayshire Scotland. William and Ann had the original farming land approx one and a half miles east of the present town and known as Springfield (this property stayed in the family until 1950). William and Ann had a daughter Mary Ann born 1867 and a son Joseph born 26 February 1872. William died 24 Dec 1901 at East Fremantle and is buried Fremantle cemetery plot 814. Ann died in Beverley on 29 April 1910 and is buried in the Anglican cemetery Beverley.
